
# THE FUTURE OF HISTORY

#### Dear Friends of the Museum,

There are a lot of exciting things happening here at the museum and we would like to share some updates with you. First off, Annoesjka Soler left the museum at the end of August. The Board of Trustees plan on conducting a search for a new director beginning in January, with the hopes that the position will be filled by March. In the spring the museum staff and board will also undergo strategic planning. Our current plan expires in 2020 and the planning process will help us assess the impacts of COVID-19 and help us figure out the next steps toward the expansion plans.

Another change that occurred in June, was the merger with the Muskegon Heritage Museum. They are officially part of the Lakeshore Museum Center and your membership now extends to that site as well.

Other exciting changes revolve around the historic sites and exhibits. The Hume House front door will be getting the stained-glass portion conserved this winter and the staff is very excited to hang new wallpaper in the Hume House upstairs bedroom. There will be two temporary exhibit changes beginning this month with Who is Rosie Lee Wilkins? Piecing Together Her History. Rosie will run through the winter and the staff hope to do some fun programming around this exhibit. Following Rosie, in May, we will have Turtle Travels, a rental exhibit up in time for summer that will appeal to our youngest visitors.

Thanks for sticking with us throughout the closure, the millage renewal, and changes in leadership. The board and staff believe the best is yet to come!

Our newest exhibit: Who is Rosie Lee Wilkins? Piecing Together Her History runs from November 9, 2020 through April 23, 2021. The exhibit showcases some of the stunning quilts Rosie created during her lifetime. This exhibit became about so much more than just the quilts while researching her history.

Unfortunately over the years, Rosie's story beyond her quilting was never documented, and we had very little to go on when the project began. As Brenda Nemetz, our Collections Manager, and Kate Curto, our Exhibits Designer, researched material for the exhibit, the story of Rosie's life unraveled to reveal a loving mother, grandmother, and friend, not just a quilt maker. The exhibit demonstrates why it is important to preserve stories of everyday life and is arguably one of the most exciting and rewarding exhibits we have done.

So stop in and not only be amazed by the craftsmanship Rosie put into creating the quilts, but learn how the stories were unraveled and the impact Rosie had on those who knew her. You will not be disappointed.

## LIFE LONG LEARNERS

This past winter, the programming staff at the Lakeshore Museum Center brainstormed a new Lifelong Learners program designed for adult and senior participants residing at assisted living facilities. We came up with four programs: Animals of Michigan, Lumbering in Michigan, Food History of Michigan, and a virtual walk through of the past and present of downtown Muskegon.

Now, after successfully transitioning our K-12 school programs to virtual offerings, we plan to do the same with our Lifelong Learners programs!

**Cost:** \$50 for Muskegon County locations; \$75 plus mileage for Out-of-County locations.

**Technology requirements:** A computer with internet access, a projector, and a screen. If you do not have a projector, you can borrow one from the museum, and we'll talk you through setting up the projector.

**Hands-on items:** We developed these programs with hands-on components. If you wish to use these items, you can stop by the museum to pick them up before the program and drop them off when finished.

If an in-person, social distanced presentation is an option at your facility, we can work to set that up with you as well.

## **INVENTION IS IN THE AIR!**



#### HISTORIC SITES VIRTUAL PROGRAMMING

The 2020 season has been an interesting one for the Historic Sites. With the late start to our season and state restrictions, almost all of our events for this year had to be cancelled. We sought new and creative ways to continue engaging our audience through virtual programming.

In May, we launched three new video series through our Facebook and Instagram pages: All Access, Room by Room, and Explore an Artifact. Each week a new video was posted to our pages, giving visitors a chance to explore our sites even from a distance. These videos have been quite successful with over 41,000 views.

Our team also developed virtual tours of the Historic Sites. Using new software that allows visitors to tour our Historic Sites as if they were there, interactive hotspots give information about artifacts and family history in addition to displaying photos, playing videos, or linking to other online resources. 
