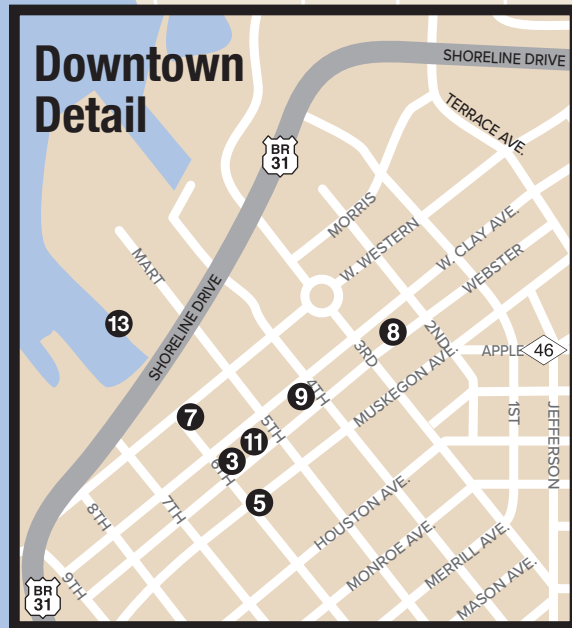

C&O Railroad Caboose Museum

Located by the White Lake Area Chamber of Commerce, the Caboose Museum offers a look into the railroading history of Montague and Whitehall. The C&O 90702 caboose was built in 1924 and was restored in 2009.

Fire Barn Museum

The Fire Barn Museum is a recreation of the original structure built in 1875. The museum features firefighting technology and how it has changed over time. Highlights include Automatic Horse Stalls, an Obenchain-Boyer Chemical Engine, a 1923 LaFrance truck, and a safety net used by Muskegon Fire Fighters.
